Los Angeles en San Francisco—The angels in San Francisco gathered on the night of April 15<sup>th</sup>, for their favorite musician was in town.

Carlos Santana brought his magic to the Fillmore—a common gathering site for exploratory music. Growing up in the San Francisco music scene, Santana has left his undeniable mark with beautiful guitar playing and a soul that is destined for heaven.

A Santana concert is like no other. Percussion at its best, mixed with a deep blues that grabs onto your heart and pumps pure energy into your soul. Every person feeling the effects of the music that pours out. Communication without talking, just knowing that you're being understood. We all feel it, but how to describe it? How do you handle the overwhelming feelings that are taking over? You don't handle them—you just accept them. Allow them to do what they're supposed do! Dance! Smile! Hug! That is the feeling. The feeling that we are all one. The blindness that takes over and leads you to the valleys of peace. Once you see this valley you will know that we were all put here together, and only together will this val-

ley prosper with great trees of love, tolerance and soulfulness. Share the fruit of music; taste its sweet juice and pass it on.

Carlos has done it again, bringing together a collection of the finest musicians in the world. Having seen him many times, I always look forward to another memorable show, and once again I was not disappointed. What could be better than Santana at the Fillmore? This is

where it all started—where you can feel the spirits that have shared their gifts with us: Jerry Garcia, Janis Joplin, Stevie Ray Vaughn, Miles

Davis and so many others. And Santana has played with many, if not all of them.

Playing with a stageful of musical cats who have all wandered these streets of rhythm, Santana opens with "Put Your Lights On." You can hear the power of Chester Thompson and his command of the keys. No stranger to the music scene, Thompson has toured with the best funk band ever—Tower of Power—

and was largely responsible for their success in the 70s. Firing up the Latin side of the Santana band you find Karl Perazzo, a long-time musi-

> cian whose journey has been alongside the best in Latin music: Cal Tjader, Tito Puente, Dizzy Gillespie, Andy Narrel and Ray Obiedo, to name but a few. Walking hand-in-hand in rhythm, we find two musicians who are so in sync, you'd think they were twins: bassist Benny Rietveld and drummer Rodney Holmes. Benny, who was on Sheila E.'s 1984 tour before joining Miles Davis in 1988 for his world tour, has found a home in the Santana family. Rodney, an explosive drummer, was in high school when he decided to be a musician, and has done everything possible to master the trade. Another master is Raul Rekow who, after seeing Santana for the first time, went out and bought a conga drum for thirty dollars and taught himself how to play. In 1976 Santana invited him to join the band. Complementing all these sounds of music is the sweet, strong tenor voice of Tony Lindsay. In addition to having toured with Santana, Tony has recorded with the best: Al Jarreau, Steve Winwood, Johnny Gill, Teddy Pendergrass, Aretha Franklin, and Lou Rawls.

Once again, I was impressed with the Santana band and can't wait to see them again. Los Angeles, watch for the 1999 tour that will bring them to the Anaheim Pond on August 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup>. Be sure to get tickets early; they always sell out.
